We continue to put effort into building community and encouraging a greater

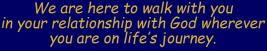
participation in the sacramental life of the Church, particularly Sunday Mass. From 2021 to 2022 our average weekly attendance based on the diocesan required count for two weekend in October increased 16% to 842. Emphasis was placed on increasing volunteers as lectors, altar servers, music ministry and eucharistic ministers. Our music ministry has also established a children's choir to encourage family participation. We have also begun adoration each Friday morning. We will continue to encourage this participation as the Church in the United States embarks upon a Eucharistic Revival. Our parish has also participated in the USCCB Jesus and the Eucharist Program. We continue to support com-

munity through monthly gatherings following the Sunday morning masses.

Our parish outreach to the local community with our Food Drives, Our Daily Bread Ministry and Jesse Tree project and support of Jericho House continues to be a powerful witness to our commitment to the gospel of charity.

Once again, thank you for all you do in the way of supporting your parish. We are called to stewardship of the resources and gifts that God entrusted to us for our mission. I ask you as you read this report to prayerfully consider what you can do in support of our community. Each individual gift of time, talent and treasure is evident every day in our liturgies, many ministries and vibrancy of our community. It is my hope that as a family you may reflect on your commitment for the next year. With over 3,000 registered families even a modest increase in contributions and volunteering from each family will have a significant impact. The Parish ended fiscal year '22-'23 in almost a breakeven position from operations, and a \$225K overall net surplus (including non-operating revenue) which was a \$256K improvement and a \$340K improvement, respectively, from the prior fiscal year.

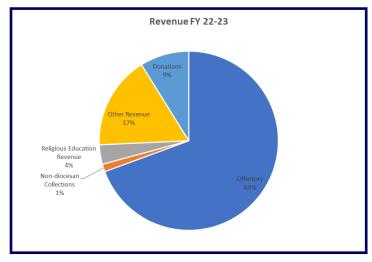
Overall net surplus exceeded budget by \$214K. Offertory revenue was up from last fiscal year due primarily to increases in the Christmas collection as well as other holy days. Expenses were reduced by \$212K from last year, mainly due to some major repairs incurred in fiscal year '21-'22, the loss of a facilities employee whose position went unfilled for all of fiscal '22-'23, and the reallocation of the finance department in greater support of the two schools. And there was a large bequest in fiscal '22-'23 that boosted non-operating revenue.

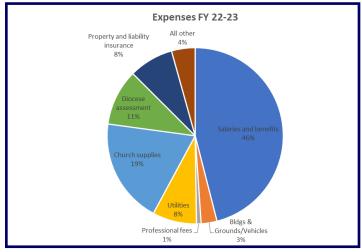

sessment. These net changes along with the reduction in bequests budgeted this year are anticipated to result in a decline of \$125K in our net surplus for fiscal '23-'24.

Our light project was finished with new lighting and electrical rewiring which has provided newfound beauty to our already magnificent and historic Church. After a success Summer Project in 2022, we were able to purchase new presider's chairs for the sanctuary as well as additional matching candlesticks for the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph altars. With the ordination of Deacon Tom we also were able to purchase new matching vestments for the presider and deacon in all the liturgical colors. We continue to focus on enhancing our church building by replacing the church doors with new more secure and energy efficient doors. The door near the Blessed Mother Altar will be modified with automatic opening to accommodate those needing special assistance. Making the church more handicap accessible.

We continue to address maintenance issues with our convent building. At the end of FY 22-23, there were 7 sisters residing in the convent. Three of the sisters are ministering at St. James. We have also painted and installed new carpeting in parts of the rectory.

Finally, we continue to improve security measures for our school communities as enrollment has increased following the pandemic through capital improvements and the hiring of additional staff.

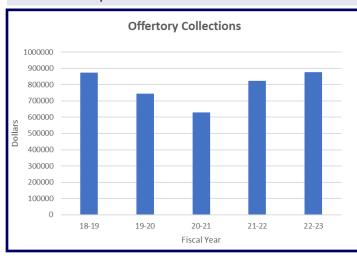

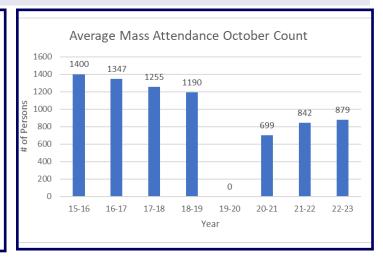

Our Religious Education Program

At the end of the 22-23 School Year, Fillie Duchaine retired from her position as Director of our Religious Education Program after 10 years of faithful and dedicated Service. We hired Lynda Fiorenza who taught Grade 8 Religion and science in the upper grades of our parish elementary school. The St. James Religious Education Program is a weekly in person program serving the children of St. James Parish in grades Kindergarten through 8. Classes are held each Sunday from 9:00 am to 10:15 am. This schedule encourages families the to attend the 10:30 Mass directly after religious instruction and helps strengthen their faith formation. Our Sacramental Preparation Program includes the Grade 2 and Grade 8 students of St. James Elementary School as well as the students registered in the Religious Education Program. Our current enrollment is 210. This number is slightly lower than last year's enrollment; however, there is an upward trend in the lower grades.

At Saint James we are a community of believers which includes families in our Religious Education Program and

families whose children are enrolled in Saint James Elementary school. As part of the mission to strengthen this community we are implementing some changes this year with the Confirmation program. In addition to their regular religious instruction, the Confirmation candidates will have several "fun" opportunities to get to know one another. In November we have scheduled a Confirmation Ice-Breaker "Funtastic Games" at Thompson Park, which will include a variety of team building games. In February, the Diocesan Youth Conference is right here at St. James Parish; additionally on February 10th we will be presenting Confirmation "Movie Night" complete with popcorn! The Confirmation Retreat, in March will be at St. Mary Parish in Colts Neck, beginning at 8:30 am and concluding with a Mass with the Confirmation families at 12:30 pm. With the theme "How the Holy Spirit Can Make You a Super-Hero" it should be an engaging, thoughtful, prayerful day.

Our First Reconciliation and First Communion programs are designed to encourage the children and families to

joyfully participate in all aspects of their faith. Some of the activities planned include several Parent Formation meetings, in which the parents are encouraged to learn more about each sacrament, connect more deeply with their own feelings of faith, and share their experiences as they guide their children in faith. The children will work on "Acts of Random Kindness", and place "Weekly Prayer Cards" with their prayer intention at the altar in our parish prayer basket. Some of the highlights of the program are the First Communion Children's Retreat, in February, which draws together the ancient traditions of the Passover meal and the institution of the Eucharist, and the Parents' Prayer Service, an evening in April specifically for the

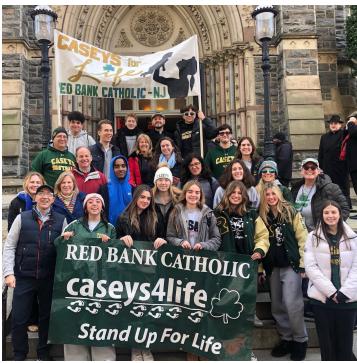
